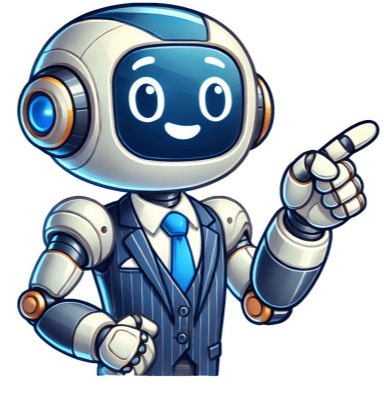

Aaron Rodgers is in no rush to make a decision about his future.The free-agent quarterback said during an appearance on “The Pat McAfee Show” on Thursday that he is “not holding anybody hostage” as he weighs whether to return for a 21st season.Rodgers was released by the New York Jets in March. The 41-year-old four-time NFL MVP has visited the Pittsburgh Steelers and talked with the Minnesota Vikings in recent weeks, but said there are certain things going on in his personal life that are currently taking precedence over anything related to football.“I have a couple people in my inner circle that are battling some difficult stuff,” Rodgers said. “I have a lot of things that are taking my attention and have, beginning in January, away from football.”Rodgers added that committing to a team is a “big thing” and indicated he will only do so when he’s ready to be all-in. He did cut down rumors that he was holding out for a multi-year contract or a big payday, saying that \$10 million for one season would be enough to get him to sign. “I told every single one of the teams I talked to (that) it wasn’t about the money,” Rodgers said. The Steelers currently have plenty of cap space and plenty of room on the roster for Rodgers. Mason Rudolph and Skylar Thompson are the only two quarterbacks currently under contract. Rodgers tried to surreptitiously visit Pittsburgh’s facility last month, flying into a regional airport and renting a Chevy Malibu in an effort not to draw attention to himself. Rodgers said it was important to meet with Steelers coach Mike Tomlin and general manager Omar Khan and get a feel for the city. He left without an agreement, though everyone from Tomlin to team president Art Rooney II has indicated the meeting was productive. Rodgers also has relationships with Pittsburgh offensive coordinator Arthur Smith and quarterbacks coach Tom Arth, who worked alongside Rodgers in Green Bay during the 2006 offseason. While Pittsburgh feels like the most natural fit for Rodgers — who also worked out with recently acquired Steelers wide receiver DK Metcalf — he also said that retirement “could still be a possibility” and he doesn’t seem to be in any sort of rush even with the NFL draft looming next week.“This entire time I haven’t felt like I owed anybody a decision at any point,” he said. “(I told them) if you need to move on, need to do something, by all means, nothing but love and respect if that’s a decision to be made.”Rodgers has also been in contact with Minnesota coach Kevin O’Connell and talked to New York Giants coach Brian Daboll, whom Rodgers said has a “beautiful football mind.”Rodgers indicated he has kept the lines of communication open, but is prioritizing his personal life at the moment.“I don’t think it was fair to the Steelers or anyone to make a decision while I’m dealing with a lot off the field,” he said. ___ AP NFL: The Giants present as an intriguing option, too, especially when considering Rodgers would only have to swap locker rooms at MetLife Stadium after spending 2023 and 2024 with the Jets. Minnesota has surfaced as an option in recent days following the departures of Sam Darnold to Seattle and Daniel Jones to Indianapolis. The Vikings are suddenly in the market for a veteran backup -- or in Rodgers' case, potential starter -- to pair with 2024 first-round pick J.J. McCarthy, who only participated in one preseason game before his rookie campaign ended due to a knee injury. A choice to head to Minnesota would complete the Brett Favre career path that Rodgers has unintentionally followed from Green Bay to New York. It might also present the most challenging scenario for Rodgers, who would logically only return to play in 2025 as a starting quarterback. These questions and hypothetical scenarios have swirled throughout the week. With Rodgers now free to sign anywhere -- and even without a shred of a timeline -- we can brace for legitimate movement on the quarterback's destination before long. Aaron Rodgers brings to the Pittsburgh Steelers a resume that is as thick as a phone book. Entering his 21st NFL season, the 41-year-old quarterback is a former Super Bowl champion four-time league MVP and its seventh all-time leading passer. He ranks sixth in regular-season victories among quarterbacks and is tied for ninth in career postseason wins. Rodgers also joined a team this summer that isn't exactly lacking in leaders. Which is why there is a belief that one of the NFL's most recognizable faces shouldn't feel compelled to become the face of a franchise, one that is asking him to help end a nearly decade-long run of playoff failure. The Steelers' lengthy courtship of Rodgers this spring dominated headlines, and it didn't slow the news cycle with the quarterback dragging out his decision until June. Still, when the Steelers report to training camp at Saint Vincent on Wednesday, there is hope Rodgers can blend in with the other 89 players on the roster and be just one of the guys. “It doesn’t have to be a big change,” said Cameron Heyward, the longest tenured Steelers player who is entering his 15th season with the organization. “Welcome him to the locker room, let him be a teammate, let him learn his way, let us learn his. “It doesn’t have to be something overblown. Let him be part of the locker room. We don’t need to build it up to be something else.” It might be wishful thinking given Rodgers’ track record on the field and his celebrity status away from it. He dated Hollywood actresses before quietly getting married this offseason to a woman whose identity he is keeping under wraps. He has hosted game shows, feuded publicly with talk-show host Jimmy Kimmel and was fined during the pandemic for violating league covid-19 protocols. For his part, Rodgers said since joining the Steelers that he longs for a quieter existence and will fade away from the spotlight once he retires, which he predicts will be after this season. ___ Until then, Rodgers wants to embrace one final season in the NFL. He decided to play for the Steelers — and opted against retirement — because it was good for his “soul,” saying it was unlike previous decisions he made in his life that were based on ego and self-fulfillment. Rodgers simply is looking for a fresh start after two unsatisfying seasons in New York. He missed all but four snaps of the 2023 season because of an Achilles injury, and he compiled a 5-12 record as a starter last year before the Jets released him. “Even with 20 years in the league and 17 as a starter, there’s still a part where you’re earning your stripes and paying your dues,” Rodgers said. “Even though I come in with that past and background, it’s important to come in with humility.” After arriving at UPMC Rooney Sports Complex to sign his contract, Rodgers sought out quarterbacks coach Tom Arth. Rodgers and Arth briefly were teammates in Green Bay in 2006, and the future Hall of Fame quarterback wanted to make sure his presence didn’t overshadow the teachings of the team’s second-year position coach. “I pulled him aside and said I want to help you as much as possible, but I’m not going to overstep my bounds,” Rodgers said. “If you want my assistance, I’m here, buddy. I want to help you.” It was the type of message Arth wanted to hear. “I’m like, ‘Aaron, please,’” Arth said. “That is going to be one of the greatest benefits to me, to all of us.” When Rodgers informed the Steelers he would be accepting their below-market value \$13.65 million contract offer, Arth asked coaching staff administrative assistant Chrissy Bulger to compile a binder of the offensive playbook. Arth noted that despite most players transitioning to an electronic playbook, Rodgers was old-school and preferred a printed version. “He walked over and at first thanked Chrissy for putting it all together,” Arth said. “He then gave her back the pencils, pens and highlighters and said, ‘I already bought my own. I don’t want you to have to order any more.’ “It was very thoughtful and a way to introduce himself to Chrissy and build that relationship.” Backup quarterback Mason Rudolph, who returned to the Steelers after a one-year absence, wasn’t sure what to make of Rodgers when he first walked into the locker room. Like a lot of people, he had heard the tabloid stories and rumors about Rodgers. He also had memories of not being greeted warmly by another future Hall of Famer, Ben Roethlisberger, when Rudolph was drafted by the Steelers in 2018. “The kind of person he is — as successful and highly compensated as he is — you don’t have to be friendly and talkative with the younger guys,” Rudolph said of Rodgers. “And he is.” Rodgers has gone on record as saying he wants to mentor rookie quarterback Will Howard, who was drafted in the sixth round after leading Ohio State to a national championship. Howard might or might not be the quarterback of the future for the Steelers, but he likely will be a part of the franchise after Rodgers has retired. “He was a super down-to-earth guy,” Howard said of his initial meeting with Rodgers. “You think he’s this big-time, famous guy. Everybody knows Aaron Rodgers, but he is down to earth, not at all what you would expect. Super personable, has treated us pretty well so far. I’m impressed by him and the way he carries himself.” Rodgers almost certainly will be named a team captain in September when the annual voting is conducted. A quarterback has been selected captain for the Steelers every year since 2010. Even Mitch Trubisky and Kenny Pickett were voted captains, respectively, in the two years following Roethlisberger’s retirement. Rodgers has received that honor 14 times in his decorated career, including 12 times in 18 seasons in Green Bay and the past two years in New York with the Jets. It is a leadership void on the Steelers, it’s on Rodgers’ side of the ball. The defense has a 10-time captain in Heyward, and a four-time selection in T.J. Watt. Special-teams ace Miles Killebrew received the designation each of the past three seasons. “That is what is really exciting about Pittsburgh is the built-in leadership that already exists there,” Rodgers said. On offense, though, the longest tenured starter is tight end Pat Freiermuth, who is entering his fifth season. New top receiver DK Metcalf is entering his seventh year but, like Rodgers, his first with the Steelers. “I just want to be a servant leader here and just pass on the knowledge that I have for 20 years, the experience and just try and fit in with the guys,” Rodgers said. “Get to know them, let them get to know me and just enjoy the process. “Everything is new. It’s like the first day of school. I don’t know a lot of guys’ names. They don’t have names on the back of the jerseys here. They don’t have names on the doors in the meeting room, so I literally walk out of the locker room lost, try and grab somebody and (say), ‘Hey, where am I going?’ But I’ll get the feel of it. However, 2023 Pro Football Hall of Fame inductee Joe Thomas isn't convinced that Rodgers can rally the troops around him and help the team bid for a Super Bowl. In fact, he is actively rooting against the Steel City team this upcoming campaign, though that is due to his allegiance to their division rivals the Cleveland Browns, having spent all 11 years of his NFL career playing at Huntington Bank Field. But with Rodgers having only won five games with the New York Jets in 2024, and going down with an Achilles tear on his Jets debut in 2023, Thomas cannot see any way how the aging quarterback can level up his play to ensure the Steelers' \$375 million spend this offseason is worth it. "There's not many quarterbacks that have had a bad year coming off injury, as they get really old, and their third or fourth teams, that have found really great success." Thomas told guest co-host Andrew Siciliano on "The Rich Eisen Show." The 10-time Pro Bowler is also somewhat skeptical about Rodgers' ability to get his teammates to buy into his style and way of leading, with the Steelers' mentality virtually being championship or bust. "Really the big question is, can they get the locker room to buy-in around him?" Thomas continued. "Earlier on in his career and even when he went to the Jets, there was a lot of hoopla and it was easy for the veterans and players on the team to buy all-in." "This was our lottery ticket, this was our missing piece. He's going to be the guy taking us to a championship." I think and find a way to get the rest of the locker room to buy into what he's selling. And to believe "Yes, he can be the Aaron Rodgers of old." "Until he does that, I think they're going to be a little lukewarm on his presence." But Steelers four-time first-team All-Pro defensive tackle Cameron Heyward has disputed those comments, saying that he feels Rodgers has "bought all-in" to the team, which in turn, has earned the players' respect.Rodgers' last winning season came in 2021 when he led the Green Bay Packers to their third consecutive 13-3 finish. Since then, he has a combined record of 14-21. But, the sometimes controversial veteran was spotted earlier this offseason training with his new receiving corps, including the blockbuster acquisition D.K. Metcalf, Scotty Miller, and tight end Pat Freiermuth. 5Rodgers' last winning season came with the Packers in 2021Credit: Getty 5Rodgers was spotted training with other pro athletes on the beachCredit: IG/ @proactivesMore recently, the 41-year-old has been spotted in a celebratory workout in California alongside other athletes, including NBA star Karl-Anthony Towns, among others, as he bids to be in the best shape possible for his NFL farewell tour.In the video, posted to Instagram by Proactive Sports Performance, Rodgers can be seen running up and down steps at the beach, as well as taking part in some activities including football, with his arm talent on full display.Despite his poor team record, Rodgers' individual numbers haven't deviated too much from his career average, with him throwing 28 touchdowns last year at a 63 percent completion rate (65.1 percent is his career average), though he also had 11 interceptions, tied for the third-most of his career in a single season. Rodgers signed a one-year deal with Steelers in June and has already hinted this is likely his final NFL season. It would be easy for the four-time MVP to go about his business and play the position, but Rodgers has been engaged and willing according to Heyward."It just felt like he has bought in, and it worked out for the best," Heyward said this week on "The Rich Eisen Show". "I know sometimes we live in a society where we want things now. But patience has a way of paying off. "As a teammate, I'm excited to go work with him."Heyward has been a focal point on Pittsburgh's defense since 2011 and is coming off his fourth first-team All-Pro nod after managing eight sacks last season. He's part of a unit that should be one of the league's best this fall, headlined by the recent acquisition of Jalen Ramsey and T.J. Watt, who remains in a contract dispute. Rodgers spent the last two seasons with Jets with subpar results before coming to terms with the Steelers. Pittsburgh hopes Rodgers brings some momentum back to an offense that has failed to show in the postseason in recent years. The Steelers haven't won a playoff game since the 2016 season, much of that do to struggling to find a difference-maker at the position since Ben Roethlisberger's retirement a few years ago. Rodgers' exit from New York included a tenuous meeting that he said came as a surprise. Prior to free agency, Rodgers allied with major league baseball's Cleveland Indians, who he signed a one-year contract with. "I didn't want any part of that. It was already a debacle," Rodgers told Pat McAfee this offseason. Pittsburgh gives Rodgers a fresh start for a storied franchise anchored by veterans like Heyward and long-time coach Mike Tomlin. Heyward's complimentary assessment of Rodgers has been echoed throughout the building this summer. The quarterback recently hosted tight ends and wide receivers for a private workout at a private workout in Malibu, California, a team-bonding effort for sure. Aaron Rodgers may choose to retire from the NFL if he doesn't get his way in free agency, according to The Athletic. As the former MVP reportedly considers offers from the New York Giants and Pittsburgh Steelers, he would prefer to sign with the Minnesota Vikings, according to the outlet. However, Minnesota also has former Michigan national champion J.J. McCarthy, the team's first-round pick in the 2024 draft. Rodgers, at 41 years old, is not considered a long-term solution for any team. Famed NFL agent Leigh Steinberg, who has negotiated contracts for multiple Hall of Fame quarterbacks, told Fox News Digital he envisions Minnesota as a "positive fit" for Rodgers at this stage in his career, especially due to McCarthy's presence as a potential protégé and the team being suited to win in the short-term. "So, you need to have a situation where, because Aaron at best maybe plays another year, maybe plays another two years, but it's not a permanent solution, so it's a one- or two-year fix," Steinberg said. "So, he could go to a team that's really good but just needs that last little piece to put them over the top, and he could mentor a younger quarterback."**BRETT FAVRE IMPLORES AARON RODGERS TO SIGN WITH ONE SPECIFIC TEAM: 'GOOD PLACE TO WIN'** Steinberg also believes a team without a chance to win in the short term with no young quarterback on its roster would not be as good a fit. The Giants are a team that fits that mold. The Steelers may have had a winning record last season but aren't a shoo-in to be good again this year. They also don't have a young project quarterback. A team that's really dissatisfied with their quarterbacking that takes him wouldn't be as positive of a solution," Steinberg said. If Rodgers does end up getting an offer from the Vikings and signing with them, he would follow a nearly identical career path to that of his Green Bay Packer predecessor, Brett Favre. Like Favre, Rodgers played the vast majority of his career with the Packers, winning a Super Bowl before being traded to the New York Jets. "By all means, sign with them," Favre said. "They got a really good football team. They're loaded at pretty much every position. They made it to the playoffs last year. They got a tremendous fan base, much like the Packers. If you get the opportunity, that's a good place to win.
