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What disabilities does social security cover

Your ex-spouse is unmarried and age 62 or older. You're considered blind if the vision in your better eye, using a corrective lens, is 20/200 or less, or if your visual field is 20 degrees or less in your better eye.6 "If your vision doesn't meet our definition of blindness, you may still qualify for disability benefits," the SSA says. SSI is a needs-based program, so qualification is based on how many resources you have. How do you qualify for SSDI? Studies show that a 20-year-old worker has a 1-in-4 chance of becoming disabled before reaching full retirement age. You won't usually be automatically enrolled in SNAP if you're getting SSI, but you can get a SNAP application—and information about other nutrition assistance programs—at any Social Security office. What Are Neurocognitive Disorders? "Extreme" is more limiting than "marked." Limitations are marked when you can complete them independently, but with significant difficulty. Getting benefits this way is called "meeting a listing." The SSA evaluates neurocognitive disorders under listing 12.02. In order to determine how severe your neurocognitive disorder is, the SSA will need to review your medical records for evidence of difficulty in thinking and understanding. Even a mild cognitive impairment combined with physical limitations can eliminate full-time work (and qualify you for disability), especially if you're at least 50 years old and unable to return to your past jobs. In 2021, the largest number of people between 60-64 receiving SSI payments qualified because of what the SSA categorizes as mental disorders: conditions like depression, schizophrenia, developmental and intellectual disorders, and the like. While a low IQ score on one test isn't enough to establish a neurocognitive disorder on its own, if you've taken multiple IQ tests and your score has dramatically decreased between them, that's strong evidence of significant cognitive decline due to a neurocognitive impairment. Dependents benefits aren't unlimited. Social Security pays disability benefits through two programs: The Social Security Disability Insurance (SSDI) program. Getting Help With Your Disability Benefits If you find yourself suddenly facing a situation where an injury or illness has left you unable to work, and are thinking about filing for Social Security Disability benefits, you may want to consider hiring a disability attorney who can help protect your rights through the process. All medically documented limitations, mental or physical, should be contained in your RFC, and the SSA is required to consider how your combined conditions affect your ability to work. Most states automatically enroll people approved for SSI into Medicaid, but not all. Your RFC is a set of restrictions on the kinds of job duties you can perform. For 2025, the average monthly benefit paid from SSDI is \$1,580, but it can be as much as \$4,018 if your income was fairly high. If you decide to appeal, you may want a Social Security disability advocate to represent you. The SSA will first determine whether your mental income, resource, and other eligibility requirements. If your symptoms are mild, you might not be able to perform your past skilled work, but Social Security could find that you could still do jobs involving simple, routine, and repetitive tasks. Most people who are awarded benefits don't get approved until after they have a hearing in front of an administrative law judge (ALJ). You still might have to pay taxes on any other income you or your spouse are earning, but your taxes should be lower. They involve completing very basic tasks, like spelling a word backwards, adding small numbers, or drawing shapes. Social Security can ask you to see a doctor on their dime—called a consultative examination—if the agency doesn't think there's enough information in your medical records to make a disability decision. The SSA may also seek information from friends, family members, or caregivers who know you well and can provide insight into your cognitive limitations. Generally, the most you and your family can receive is 150% of your SSDI benefit. If you've received brain imaging studies (such as an MRI or CT scan), the agency will look at those as well. The Supplemental Security Income (SSI) program. Also, SSI benefits are not based on your work history. Your local Social Security office will send your claim to a federally funded state agency called the Disability Determination Services (DDS). If your doctor agrees to write a letter describing your cognitive impairments, the SSA will take that into consideration when determining whether you're disabled—as long as the opinion isn't at odds with the rest of the medical record. Social Security accepts evidence of a decline in the following cognitive areas for the purposes of meeting the neurocognitive disorders listing: complex attention (being able to divide focus) executive function (controlling your thoughts and actions) learning and memory (retaining and using information) language (communicating without errors in grammar or word choice) perceptual-motor (coordinating your movements with your environment), or social cognition (understanding the behavior of others). Significant Cognitive Decline The first step towards meeting listing 12.02 is showing that you have "significant cognitive decline from a prior level of functioning." Basically, this means that you'll need to prove that your mental abilities have gotten worse since the onset (beginning) of your neurocognitive disorder. The DDS uses the Social Security Administration's disability criteria to make its determination.10 Is it hard to qualify for SSI disability benefits? Social Security retirement benefits are calculated based on your work history and income, so any time spent not working can lower the amount of your retirement benefits. Also known as auxiliary benefits, dependents benefits are available to your spouse, ex-spouse, children, and sometimes grandchildren if you receive SSDI. Severe impairments can be physical or mental in nature. Social Security will pay benefits to your spouse in either of the following instances: Your spouse is 62 or older and you've been married for at least one year, unless your spouse is collecting a higher Social Security benefit than you are.
